# **Executive Summary**

#### Introduction:

Gokhale Memorial Girls' College is a women's college affiliated under the University of Calcutta. It is a grants-in-aid college located at 1/1, Harish Mukherjee Road, Kolkata-700029. It was established in 1938 as an extension of Gokhale Memorial Girls' College and has since then served as a premier institution for women's education. Its students have taken its legacy to regions all over the country and abroad.

The objectives of academic excellence, social responsibility and national pride have driven the institution in its 84-year journey. In its dedicated pursuit of the mission set by the founders, the institution has been successful in withstanding the challenges that have come its way and has secured a position of national repute. It has made its mark in providing liberal education with essential values based on the vision of its founder Sarala Ray, popularly known as Mrs. P. K. Ray, a great social reformer and educationist, ardent disciple of the great patriot Gopal Krishna Gokhale, a distinguished teacher, educationist and freedom fighter. As a social reformer Sarala Ray's primary objective was not merely to churn out women graduates intellectually sound but also to train them to become worthy citizens, capable home-builders and conscientious workers in their chosen field of activity. The College is currently functioning under the able leadership and guidance of Dr. Atashi Karpha, Principal. The College is currently preparing for the 3rd Cycle accreditation. In the previous two cycles the college was awarded Grade "B" status. The college is known for its strict adherence to the principles of maintaining student discipline and staff diligence. The College strives to maintain consistently high standards of comprehensive growth of its students in the contemporary scenario of deteriorating values and standards within an environment of constant flux.

# Criteria wise Summary

# Curricular Aspects:

GMGC is affiliated to the University of Calcutta and strictly adheres to the curriculum specified by the University. CBCS (Six Semesters) system for the three-year BA and BSc, (Honours, General and Major) programs have been introduced from 2018. The College offers 13 Honours courses and 3 Major (Vocational) courses. Sanskrit and Sociology are offered as generic subjects only while Environment Studies is a compulsory subject to be read in Semester II.

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The College follows the Academic Calendar of the University, the notifications on admission, registration, examination form fill-up, examination schedule, etc. and all are communicated to the students by timely notification posted in college website.

The Institution makes consistent efforts for efficient delivery of the curriculum and students' preparedness through continuous internal evaluation (CIE) processes. Departments draw up their Academic Calendars (Study Plans) for timely completion of syllabus. Students' progress, attendance, etc. are communicated to the guardians through parent-teacher meetings. Faculty meets regularly for academic planning. Student seminars and presentations enhance capabilities.

The institution has a MOU with PMIT for Add-on Value-added Courses viz. Computer Course, Supervisory Skills & HR Associate. Introduction of Spoken English and Communicative German Language courses in association with the Ramakrishna Mission Institute of Culture, Kolkata is under process. The three Major vocational degree courses and the Add-on courses serve to generate employability. Enrollment in Swayam-NPTEL distance learning courses has been continued.

Cross cutting issues pertaining to environment, gender etc. are integrated into the prescribed curriculum and taken up in lectures and workshops.

All students under Major degree programs mandatorily undertake project and internships and on-job trainings. Several Honours subjects have curriculum portions devoted to experiential project work.

In every academic session, the College obtains feedbacks from the Students, Guardians, Teachers, Non-teaching staff and Alumni stakeholders. These are processed by an external expert and the final reports are placed in the Academic Sub-Committee meetings for taking resolutions on actions to be taken. Curriculum design feedback is obtained from students and faculty. Departments are directed by the IQAC to forward the observations to the members of the UG Board of Studies for necessary follow action.

#### Teaching-learning and Evaluation:

- 2.1 Average Enrolment percentage during last five Years- 53.59 %
- **2.1.2** Percentage of seats filled against reserved categories (SC, ST, OBC etc.) as per applicable reservation policy for the first year admission during the last five years- 29.25 %
- **2.3** The teachers of Gokhale Memorial Girls' College are tech-savvy and they use technology efficiently for teaching learning process. ICT enabled teaching helps the students to learn the topics easily and effectively. Proper use of ICT makes the learner more interested in the class, which enables them to participate actively in the learning process which in turn enhances their problem solving ability.
- **2.4.1** Percentage of full-time teachers against sanctioned posts during the last five years-91.11 %
- **2.4.2** Percentage of full time teachers with NET/SET/SLET/ Ph. D./D.Sc. / D.Litt./L.L.D. during the last five years (consider only highest degree for count)-82.32 %
- 2.6.3 Pass percentage of Students during last five years (excluding backlog students)-96.84%
- **2.5.1** Several procedures are followed to maintain the mechanism for dealing with **internal assessment**-related grievances in a transparent, time-bound and efficient manner. All question-paper related issues are directly addressed by the departmental faculty themselves. After evaluation the answer-papers are shown to the students for self-inspection and if necessary those are also shown to the guardians during the Parent-Teacher meetings.

- 1. the results of the internal assessment, performance and activities consisting of assignments / tutorials

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2. result of external examination conducted by the university.

#### Research, Innovations and Extension:

Metric: 3.1.1: In 2019-20 Rs. 5.15 lakh and in 2021-22 Rs. 0.65 lakh were received as research grant from Department of Science & Technology and Biotechnology, Government of West Bengal for carrying project work entitled 'Development of small molecule catalysts for bio-inspired oxidation reactions and for degradation of organic pollutants' under supervision of Dr. Anangamohan Panja, Associate Professor, Department of Chemistry.

Metric: 3.2.1: Central Research Project Committee and Students' Research Cell submitted their projects entitled "Durga Puja: Festival or Industry" and "Survey on the Effect of Covid - 19 on the Society, Economy and Culture" respectively.

Gokhale Memorial Girls' College published fourth volume of Academia:GMGC, a multi-disciplinary, peer reviewed, annual academic journal (ISBN 2348-7054) in 2017. This volume included 26 articles.

- Metric 3.2.2: In all, 16 workshops/seminars/conferences on specified area were conducted in last 5 years. 2 of them were on research methodology, 10 of them were on skill development and 4 of them were on entrepreneurship.
- **Metric 3.3.1:** Total 89 numbers of research papers were published in last five years. 35 of them are CARE and UGC enlisted journals. Rests of them were published in peer-reviewed journal. Number of research papers published per teacher is 1.24.
- **Metric 3.3.2:** Total 58 numbers of such publications were published in last 5 years. 0.81 is the value of contribution per teacher.
- **Metric 3.4.1:** Being actively associated with various social activities organized by NSS, Social awareness club etc, many of our students could find immense motivation in continuing with social service through different NGOs even after passing out from this college.
- Metric 3.4.2: Students and teachers of the college received certificates of recognition from Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural Education (MGNCRE) for various extension activities.
- Metric 3.4.3: In all 48 extension and outreach programmes were conducted in last five years through Social awareness club, NSS Unit-1, IQAC, MGNCRE-SESREC cell etc of Gokhale Memorial Girls' College.
- Metric 3.5.1: Total 5 numbers of MoUs were functional in last five years.

# Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

4 new classrooms have been added to the existing 22 rooms in past five years. One meeting-cum-board room has also been built.

14 new computers have been purchased along with 1 server and 1 laptop. Among these 14 desktops, 8 are for students' use and have been given to various departments.

There are 2 classrooms/seminar halls with LED projectors and audio facilities. Moreover, college has 2 more mobile projectors.

All computers are equipped with internet facilities.

6 departments have been provided with wall mount LED TV which they use for various academic purposes and video lectures demonstrations.

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College is dedicated to the safety of its users. Good safety measures are in place throughout the campus. Smoke detection system, fire alarm, fire extinguisher, CCTV are regularly maintained.

Pre-pandemic, college had internet speed of 200 MBps. Post pandemic, additional 50 MBps speed had been secured at first. From December 2021 (after the first reopening of the college for offline classes) the college bought additional internet connection from Alliance Broadband Pvt. Ltd. which serves enhanced internet speed of 300 MBps.

New wifi routers are placed throughout the campus to distribute the internet connectivity. The campus is a fully wifi zone.

After the Covid lockdown, the college was prompt to secure G-suite account for all teachers and departments. Examination was also held in online G-suite account.

After the resumption of classes post-Covid, the college procured thermal gun, Fumigation machines, touch free liquid sanitizer machines for maintaining Covid protocol.

New Instruments for laboratory based subjects have been procured using RUSA 2.0 fund.

A new wifi enabled interactive panel board with touch sensitivity and integrated audio-visual system has been installed.

All computers are uploaded with anti-virus. Laboratory equipments are well maintained by the attendant.

Safety and security measures are maintained regularly. Whenever some instruments are at fault, maintenance service providers are called for.

Computers are regularly formatted and updated.

The college admission is a completely online process. It was outsourced to Aidni Pvt. Ltd.

Student registration is also outsourced to the same company.

College website is prepared and maintained by Braindrops Web design and Solutions.

# Student Support and Progression:

The criterion concentrates on two major areas of student development- student support and student progression. The metrics included, focus upon the different measures taken up by the institution to support the pupils financially and otherwise along with tracing their further progression details into higher education. The initial three metrics evaluate financial support provided by the institution (5.1.1) in the form of government and non-government scholarships provided to the students, the capability-enhancement and skill-building opportunities created by the institution (5.1.2), and the career counselling and training for competitive examinations (5.1.3). The institutional data indicates that it facilitates financial assistance in the form of govt and non-govt scholarships and assistance to 10.10 percent of the student body. The capability enhancement initiatives span across a plethora of activities organized by the institution including soft skill, physical activity, language and ICT training opportunities for the students. The institution is still on its way to providing training for competitive examinations. Career counselling initiatives have been taken though, and extended to about 19 per cent of the students in the last five years. More than 50 per cent of the students have progressed to higher education and have been placed at various organisations (5.2.1). Almost 12 per cent of the students have cleared international, national and/or state-recognised competitive examinations (5.2.2). Around 48 prizes, awards and recognitions have been received in these five years (5.3.1) and the average percentage of events, the students participated in (both institutional & external), has been around 40 per cent (5.3.2). The criterion also provides insights into grievance management strategies and the institutional defence mechanisms against ragging, bullying and harassment (5.1.4). The institution

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has an Anti-Ragging Cell and an Internal Complaint Committee and is equipped with sufficient mechanisms to address such issues though the incidence rate of such events is mostly negligible.

# Governance, Leadership and Management:

The institution aims to develop and empower women through general and vocational education so that the students are ready to respond to global concerns and global demands.

Academic excellence and teacher-student relationship are the strong areas of the institution. Even during the pandemic, the teachers went an extra mile to ensure academic continuity and teacher-student interaction. During the Covid-19 pandemic period, a G Suite account was provided to all departments, along with Wi-Fi facility, for the smooth functioning of online classes.

The students, too, express their attachment with their alma mater through an active alumni association.

The Governing Body, in unison with the Principal, the teaching and non-teaching staff, and the statutory and non-statutory committees work towards providing the students with a harmonious environment.

Keeping up with the changing times, the institution has time and again used and upgraded the use of ICT not only in the teaching-learning process but also in areas of administration, finance, to ensure ease of admission.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) reviews teaching learning process. Teachers maintain Self-Appraisal Dairies. Students and Parents are also asked to review the structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities.

The institution has an effective appraisal system for Teaching and Non-teaching staff. Every year the outgoing students carry out and submit teacher evaluation and campus evaluation surveys through feedback forms. The duly filled in forms are analysed and the report obtained therein is judiciously addressed for the betterment of the teaching learning process.

A general Student Satisfaction Survey is carried out regarding delivery of services like library facilities, internet facility, reading room environment, capability of librarian, infrastructure of the college, auditorium, security arrangements, adjudging teaching standard, punctuality of the teachers, syllabus completion, use of digital tools in both honours and general courses.

#### Institutional Values and Best Practices:

Instutution' svision mission and motto revolves around holistic education.

Instituional values and best practices include the following-

- Library Orientation Programmes (LOPs) are organized every year for new entrants to make them aware about the Central Library as an important campus resource, its services, rules and regulations. LOPs were conducted both for the teachers and all the students during the Covid-19 pandemic lockdown in the virtual mode to disseminate information about the e-books and e-resources purchased with RUSA 2.0 grants.
- The institution has endeavoured to cater to the needs and aspirations of its students. One of these is mental health. Awareness about mental health is promoted through workshops and lectures. The Department of Psychology is in charge of the Counselling Cell. The college counsellor meets all students in regular pre-set schedules and batches to make the service inclusive for all students and conduct special sessions to address specific needs.

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• A best practice of the institution is to nurture the latent talents and abilities of the students through various inclusive activities which give equal opportunity notwithstanding their different intellectual levels and backgrounds. Student seminars and paper presentations promote academic and reaearch orientation and enhance capabilities.

- Value inculcation, building good habits through practice, following the code of conduct, partaking in
  community work, build good and strong personalities. Some of the regular such activities are Blood
  Donation, Social Outreach, Social Awareness Club activities, NSS participation, SES REC
  engagement, special observances, commemorative events and College Exhibition where students learn
  to participate with few resources, adapt to working in a small space, develop fellow-feeling and learn to
  respect diversity.
- The institution strives to implement effective policies to faciliate the students. The Student Welfare Sub-Committee works closely with the HOI to identify needy and meritorious students for providing financial assistance. Awareness workshops disseminate information about government grants and schoolarships that students can avail.
- The campus is green and clean. There is a plantation with a herbal corner which is nurtured with utmost care. The institution has a well-defined Green and Clean Campus Policy and an Environment and Energy Usage Policy to conserve and manage its environment.

# Institutional preparedness for NEP GMGC is affiliated to the University of Calcutta and does not have the prerogative to alter the prescribed CBCS curriculum. The curriculum however, in different disciplines have been framed by the university such that they have interdisciplinary topics that can be taught by the faculty of a different discipline. This is exactly what is attempted in GMGC. Departments identify the interdisciplinary portions and approach the faculty of another discipline who would be best suited to deliver that topic. This establishes an interdepartmental exchange of faculty within the 1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary: institution and helps in the best delivery of the curriculum. The college thus tries to identify the programme learning outcomes along with courses and unit learning outcomes that define the specific knowledge, skills, attitudes and values that are to be acquired by the learner and ensures that each program achieves its goal. The College already has three well-conducted three-year Vocational Degree Courses under the affiliating University since 2004. These are: • Advertising, Sales Promotion and Sales Management • Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics • Communicative English Regarding the implementation of Academic Bank 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC): of Credits, the institution has yet to obtain a green

signal from the affiliating University. The College in the near future will follow directives of the affiliating University for registering on the ABC platform to facilitate the students - a step forward in adopting NEP 2020. The pedagogical approach of the institution is student-centric where the faculty's pedagogical approach hinges on helping students to develop fundamental knowledge and is constructivist, inquiry-based and integrative. Summative and Formative assessments and assignments are used to evaluate the students' difficulty levels, learning outcomes and preparedness.

3. Skill development:

The extension of add-on programs along with curriculum is critical for hastening skill development. There has been a shift in recent times in the psyche of college students. Students no longer flock to higher education institutions just for the experience or for the chance to become "more well-rounded." Instead, students seek out a college education to ensure they are more employable after graduation or look for degrees that can ensure employment in future. More often than not employment outcomes after graduation are not as desired or expected. In Gokhale Memorial Girls' College, students come from various lived experiences, cultural backgrounds, financial situations and ability levels. Many of them require the basic skills that could help in career-building or help them cope with difficult and challenging aspects of adult life. In adherence to the principles of holistic education the College undertakes several initiatives in every academic session to help the students develop additional employability skills and other life skills. The college has value-added courses which are employable skill-development certificate courses offered to all students in collaboration with Pranavananda Institute of Technology and Management (Affiliated to MAKAUT). These are: • Computer Course (Duration Three Years) • HR Associate and Supervisory Skills (Duration Two Years) Mentoring by faculty is one of the practices of the institution, to enable students to explore future employment pathways after graduation, and help them get the most of their studies. The college has a Counselling Cell which arranges regular counselling sessions for all students in batches by an external expert. Mentoring and counselling together are practices that aim at helping at helping students develop academic interest, life skills, communication skills, social skills, career skills and work-place related skills. in tandem with the policy of building student skills, the college has in recent times introduced new Add-on courses, viz., Spoken English and Communicative German

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4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The promotion of Indian languages, arts and culture is beneficial not only to the country but also to individuals. It instils both regional and national pride. GMGC offers – • Honours Courses Bengali, English and Hindi • Major (Vocational) Course in Communicative English • Bengali, English and Hindi and Sanskrit as generic subjects • Hindi, Bengali and English as compulsory AECC-1 (choice) subjects to be read in Semester-I in CBCS Teaching-Learning is conducted basically in Bengali and English. The institution commemorates significant dates and hosts activities in in all these three languages with equal importance to instil a sense of regional pride. Hindi is accorded equal importance as Bengali as programs, activities and special lectures in the language are conducted from time to time and incorporated in cultural and cocurricular events such as during celebration of Teachers' Day, College Foundation Day, Independence Day, Parakram Divas, Republic Day, Hindi Divas, International Women's Day, World Environment Day and such others. Preservation and promotion of the languages taught is an important future objective of the College.

#### 5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The CBCS curriculum accords due consideration to economic and social needs at large and is aligned with the spirit of NEP. All courses focus on outcome based learning with objective of equipping the students to face the future. Adequate learning is sought to be achieved through planning and assessment. Additionally, value-based education imparted in GMGC complements the NEP as social service, environmental education, are embedded in the curriculum. College encourages students to participate in NSS, NCC, social outreach, SES REC activities, institutional and external competitions and cultural events. Human values, gender sensitization, gerontology, social awareness, community health awareness & promotion are all part of college and department programmes. College Codes guide the staff, students and guardians in ethics, values and responsibilities. Environmental Sciences is a course that looks at all areas of environmental sustainability. Environmental and Health consciousness is promoted through special observances and initiatives such as Swachhta Pakhwada, No Singleuse Plastic, World Environment Day, Special Lectures on environmental pollution, NSS Plantation Protection and SES REC Clean Campus initiatives, No-Tobacco Day, Rashtriya Poshan Maah, Cancer Awareness Drive, and SES REC Woman's Nutrition & Empowerment Drive and Thalassemia Awareness and Check-up drives The faculty strives to deliver the CBCS course curriculum with – • Clarity of focus - This means the faculty teaches is clearly focussed on what they

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want the students to know and teach the teach the syllabus in such a manner that so that the students know what they are expected to learn, understand what they are being taught, are able to apply develop the knowledge and that can help them to achieve the intended outcomes. • Designing down -The CBCS curriculum prescribed by the Affiliating University is clearly set and outcomes are adequately articulated. The curriculum design of the Honours and the Major (Vocational) are explained by the faculty right at the outset to each new batch of students in a Semester. Students are made aware of the (graduation) outcomes to be achieved at the end of the program. The Faculty draws up the study plan (departmental academic calendar) to deliver the syllabus efficiently within the stipulated time and guide the students through internal assessment tests to ensure their preparedness and help them achieve high scores in the final examination. • High expectations - Teachers establish high and challenging standards of achievement for the students through class assessments, so that students can better themselves at every step. They provide special guidance if necessary. • Expanded opportunities - Teachers of the institution identify the students at different difficulty levels. Not all learners can learn the same thing in the same way and in the same time. Such learners are identified by teachers and specially guided. Peer-Tutoring and Remedial classes are held to facilitate weak learners. Class and home assignments are provided to encourage students to better themselves. Strong learners are motivated towards further improvement and enhancement in their learnings.

6. Distance education/online education:

Distance learning has been facilitated through the Swayam-NPTEL Courses since 2017 when the College became a local chapter of the Swayam-NPTEL, a MHRD initiative. Sessions are conducted by the learned faculty of IIT, Kharagpur. Students get enrolled in multiple courses offered by IIT Kharagpur every half-yearly session. During the Covid-19 pandemic lockdown, the institution imparted all its course content in online mode in digital platforms such as Zoom and Google Meet, WebEx app, Google Suite etc.. Every department and every teacher was provided a Gsuite account to ensure smooth delivery of syllabus, provision of study material formative evaluations. Due to the experience gained during lockdown period of Covid-19, access to online resources by educators and students is not a constraint anymore. ICT tools are now at the finger tips of students and teachers. The faculty in GMGC uses different ICT methods as feasible to deliver curriculum as well conduct other academic functions. The Central library has purchased e-resources, trained the faculty and students in ways to access these through special

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Library Orientation Programme, a best practice of the college. The Central Library website (https://gmgclibrary.wordpress.com/) guides teachers and students in remote-accessing of eresources of the institution's central library as well as those available in N-list of INFLIBNET. Online/distance learning shall be more facilitated as classrooms are equipped with computers with virus protection, wi-fi connectivity, led projectors, smart TVs. There is an ICT class room with smart panel installed for remote teaching, learning and econtent development. The institution has plans for further extension of ICT facilities in future.

# **Institutional Initiatives for Electoral Literacy**

Electoral Literacy Cell has been set up and communicated to the Office of the Election Commission. Electoral Literacy Club will be set up in the current session as soon as students return to College after the Semester-End Examinations.

The coordinating faculty members have been appointed by the HOI. Electoral Literacy Club will be formed with student members when the Semester-end examinations have been completed. ELC will become functional once it gets formed in the right perspective. The college is committed to making the ELC representative by including students from all socio-economic backgrounds.

3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.

ELC has not been formed yet. However, the College will undertake a suitable policy by deploying students resources as best as possible through NSS Unit-1, MGNCRE SES REC, NCC and the Social Awareness Club of the College. Students shall be encouraged to take voluntary initiatives to spread the awareness of ethical voting particularly in areas and among local communities where they come from and which they are familiar with. Students will also be encouraged to participate in voter awareness campaigns especially among the transgender, senior citizens and underprivileged women and youth.

4. Any socially relevant projects/initiatives taken by College in electoral related issues especially research projects, surveys, awareness drives, creating content, publications highlighting their contribution to advancing democratic values and participation in electoral processes, etc.

Once the ELC is constituted, the college will engage the students to to conduct electoral related issues and awareness drives, creation of content through the college magazine and dissemination of democratic values among peers and taking up research projects aptly guided by the faculty coordinators.

# 1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

#### Answer:

The teaching strategy in CBCS hinges on sequence of topics, the reading material available, lesson planning, and the accuracy of topic presentation. Stress is laid on clarity of delivery, topic completion and topic revision. Faculty guides students in conceptual ideas, analytical approach, communication, diligent study and preparedness for examinations.

Course learning requirements are discussed in departmental meetings and Departmental Academic Calendar (Study Plan) is drawn up to assign topics according to the teacher's specialization. However, added assignments are also undertaken as required. Thus the faculty has general proficiency in delivering all the topics in the syllabus.

Learning is made inclusive by providing text book matter, printed, hand-written and electronic reference study materials keeping in mind the needs of diverse learners.

As such, the College follows the University directives on Academic Calendar, Admissions and Examinations and plans its teaching and examination processes accordingly. However, CIE processes are devised by the department in the form of class tests, mock tests, open book tests, home assignments etc. to identify students at different difficulty levels and remedial, supplementary, doubt-clearing and peer-tutoring classes are arranged for slow learners. Prior to introduction of CBCS, the old system of internal evaluation was in the form of mid-term test and a Selection Test. These were supplemented by the internal CIE processes. In new CBCS system, Internal assessments are made according to the University schedule. Marks awarded are directly uploaded in the Uiversity portal in the account of the student. Thus CIE processes are crucial for identifying students different difficulty levels to arrange for Remedial Lectures, revision classes etc.

A tentative Academic and Administrative Calendar of the College is mentioned in the college prospectus. It is designed to accommodate extra-curricular activity, special observance days and continuous evaluation. Notices are duly posted in the college website as well in the Notice Book maintained in the Principal's Office. Departmental academic calendars (Study Plans) indicate the syllabus distribution among the faculty. Departmental draws up class routines based on the master routine prepared by the Time-Table Committee at the start of the academic session and conveyed to the students.

During the Covid-19 pandemic lockdown, online classes were conducted for syllabus completion. Gsuite accounts were provided by the instituttion to each department and to each teacher for conducting classes smoothly. Timetables were designed to deliver the syllabus as best as possible and in the most-student friendly manner. Special routines were drawn up the departments initially and subsequently the usual master routine was followed once full adjustments could be made to the disruptions caused by the Covid-19 ailment/internet connectivity problems. Faculty provided the reading material in online classrooms, through emails and through uploads in the college website as students were not able to visit the library physically.

Due to the statutory lockdown declared by the Govt. of India and Govt. of West Bengal during the Covid-19 pandemic, the University did not declare the Academic Calendar for academic sessions 2020-21 and 2021-22 and only the Notification for UG Admission was declared for the academic session 2021-22.

# 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

#### **Answer:**

The teachers of Gokhale Memorial Girls' College are tech-savvy and they use technology efficiently for teaching learning process. **ICT enabled teaching** helps the students to learn the topics easily and

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effectively. Proper use of ICT makes the learner more interested in the class, which enables them to participate actively in the learning process which in turn enhances their problem solving ability. Keeping this in mind the College has provided computer and internet connection in every department which are widely used by the teachers for teaching as well as for giving hands-on exposure to many aspects of the courses. At the same time computers are used for preparation of lectures and study materials. Power Point Presentation through LCD Projectors, use of smart TV etc. are generally followed for this purpose. Smart classrooms are also available through which teachers can deliver and record their lectures and upload in different social sites like YouTube.

**During COVID-19 pandemic** many lab based departments prepared tutorial videos for explaining practical experiments, using Paintbrush, Powerpoint animation and OBS Studios. The videos were uploaded in Youtube thereafter and the links were shared with the students. In addition, new online modes of teaching have been adopted. G-suite accounts have been created for all the teachers. Online python programming compiler is often used to compile and run codes. Teacher uses projector to show simple example codes and explain various components of the code and concepts to the students. Codes and the outputs are compiled together in a word file and prints are taken.

Language departments present movie adaptations of texts on various topics. Arts and Social science departments also show videos to make the teaching —learning process interesting and easy. During pandemic teachers used virtual platforms like Zoom meeting, Edmodo, Google meet for conducting online classes. For giving assignment and study materials google classroom was used. Mock test, Internal and External evaluation of answer scripts and uploading of marks were performed through Google class room.

In classroom when students are physically present students s' participative learning is ensured through

- Group discussions.
- Special Lectures.
- Mock Viva voce.
- Doubt-clearing sessions.
- Film Screening and film review as experiential learning.
- Class tests
- During Covid-19 lockdown, the same methods were continued to be applied in the digital mode.

**The College Library** is on the verge of becoming fully computerized. Book search and cataloguing are all electronically done. Users can access the library through Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC). Access to e-resources is provided through N-LIST programme of INFLIBNET. Photocopying and scanning facilities are also available in Library.

# 2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

#### Answer:

Several procedures are followed to maintain the mechanism for dealing with **internal assessment**-related grievances in a transparent, time-bound and efficient manner. All question-paper related issues are directly addressed by the departmental faculty themselves. After evaluation the answer-papers are shown to the students for self-inspection and if necessary those are also shown to the guardians during the Parent-Teacher meetings. The Faculty deals with any girevances through explanations and clarifications and if necessary through rectifications. The parents can express their views about their ward's performance in the presence of all the faculty members of the department. In case of poor performance by a student, the department asks the respective guardian to visit the HOD and other faculty members for a discussion addressing the reslevant issue.

The college conducts **mock-tests** before the final university exams. All answer-scripts are evaluated by the departmental faculty members and are shown to the students in the class. Problems regarding script evaluation, question papers, mark rectification (if any) and all other grievance -related issues are dealt with in the most transparent, efficient and time-bound way as far as practicable.

The answer papers of the **internal and tutorial examinations** are preserved by the department for five years as directed by the University of Calcutta.

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The final examinations (external), both under the CBCS and the Old (1+1+1) system, are conducted centrally by the University of Calcutta.

The University has a provision for **self-inspection/ reviewing** of evaluated answer scripts.

#### 3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

#### Answer:

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A 'Central Research Project Committee' was established in Gokhale Memorial Girls' College in the year 2015 with the objective to teach and train the students in research methodology for their future progression, apart from teaching them the syllabi. The students generally carry out a project. The theme of the project is normally chosen from one of the current socio economic and cultural issues, to make the students aware of their society, polity, economy and environment to bring them up as responsible citizens of the country. The first project entitled "Durga Puja: Festival or Industry" was submitted on 20.03.2018. The students from the departments of English, Philosophy, Psychology, Communicative English, and Clinical Nutrition & Dietetics participated in this survey based project. In 2021-22 the committee was restructured as 'Students' Research Cell' which started its journey with the project on the Pandemic which came as a rude shock, not only to the people of this country but almost to all the countries of the world. Dreadfulness of the disease and it's high fatality rate along with complete lockdown, affected people's mental health as well as economic condition. The title of the project was "Survey on the Effect of Covid - 19 on the Society, Economy and Culture". Students from the departments of Bengali, Education, Economics, Geography, Hindi, History, Philosophy and Political science worked on this project. They collected data from the people belonging to different strata of the society, reports published in print media, discussions held in the electronic media and of course on their own experiences. After analysing those materials, students of each department submitted a report which were compiled in the final report.

Carrying on these projects and surveys students were benefitted by learning:

- 1) How to collect and use the sources for writing a report.
- 2) How to work as a group
- 3) How to create awareness of the current problems.
- 4) How to build up leadership quality.

Gokhale Memorial Girls' College published fourth volume of **ACADEMIA**, a multi-disciplinary, peer reviewed, annual academic journal (ISBN 2348-7054) in 2017. 26 numbers of articles were published in this volume.

#### **Answer:**

An Integrated Library Management System is a software that is designed to manage all the functions of a library. It is basically an automation in the library to perform tasks such as acquisition, cataloging, and circulation. The automated systems in the central library of the GMGC are:

## Pre-pandemic

- 1. Barcoding of library books done in 2017
- 2. Central Library has been using LibSys Library Management Software from 2008.
- 3. The upgraded version of LMS also has an Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC) facility.
- 4. Library Management Software was initially a single user client server architecture model. It was gradually upgraded first to 3-users and then to 5-users model.
- 5. Library has a UGC network center, where users can access online information.
- 6. College Central Library has an institutional Membership of Inflibnet, to access all NLIST eresources.
- 7. Central Library also has an institutional membership of the British Council Library.

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- 8. A week-long Library Orientation Program is conducted for new students.
- 9. Issuing of books operated through a barcode system started in the 2018-19 session.
- 10. Members of college Alumni Association can access the college central library.
- 11. College central library also has book bank facility for economically weaker students where they can borrow books from the library book bank for one full year.

## Post-pandemic

- 1. College Library created a Library Website during the pandemic situation in August 2020. Website address is https://www.gmgclibray.wordpress.com
- 2. Through this website library users can access the library resources from their home.
- 3. Remote access was provided for the first time to 209 titles that have been purchased from different publishers.

#### **Answer:**

Gokhale college is always the forerunner in using ICT enabled pedagogy in the teaching learning process, even during the pre-pandemic period. The college started procuring required ICT tools well ahead of time and teachers started taking classes using PPT presentations for delivering lectures well before the pandemic.

## 1. Pre-pandemic period

- College used to have 200 MBps internet connectivity during the 2018-19 period. In 2019-20, additional 50 Mbps is added to make the connection speed 250 Mbps.
- Number of computers has been increased from **42** in the year 2017-18 to **50** in the academic year 2018-19, followed by even further expansion of computing facilities to 57 in the subsequent years.

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• Lecture Theater-2 has a permanent roof mounted LED projector machine where seminars/webinars are usually held.

- A smart classroom with smart board, wi-fi enabled LCD projector, a desktop and audio-system was installed with the help of West Bengal Electronic Industries Development Corporation Limited (WEBEL) on 31/3/2017.
- Library has reprographic facility for students and teachers. 2 printers and 1 barcode scanner for the library were bought in 2019.
- Additionally two more printers were purchased in 2020.

## 2. Post-pandemic period

A seismic change took place in the use of technology in teaching-learning during the pandemic.

- In 2020-21, college upgrades internet connectivity speed to 300 MBps. The college procures a high speed internet connection plan "VELOSITI\_300" from service provider IndiNET Services Pvt. Ltd.
- In the year 2022, the college has bought additional internet connection from Alliance Broadband Services Pvt. Ltd (along with the previous plan from IndiNET).
- Several wi-fi routers have been installed in both the buildings to set-up and distribute the connection in the entire campus.
- Internet connectivity is password protected, however, students can access the internet through a QR code scan using their mobile devices.
- Post pandemic the college was quick to acquire G-suite accounts for all teachers to facilitate running online teaching and examinations smoothly.
- With the teaching process shifting towards virtual mode, lecture notes are made available on the college website and also in G-suite classrooms, where students can access them easily.
- Two computers brought in 2017 were installed in library. Ten more brought in 2018. 1 in Physics, 3 in Mathematics, 1 in Chemistry, 4 in Office-2 and other installed in library.
- Digital platforms such as Zoom, Google Meet, Microsoft Teams were used extensively to take classes during the initial phase of the lockdown period. After securing the G-suite account, it became mandatory to use Google Meet for delivering lectures.
- Google Classroom were used as Learning Management Systems (LMS) to conduct online classes and online examinations.
- Digital tools, such as Xodo Pdf writer, Microsoft Edge, Adobe Reader etc. to check and evaluate answer scripts submitted online.
- Teachers used Open Broadcaster Software (OBS) to make video lectures and demonstrations for the experiments. These have been uploaded on the YouTube channels.

Personal G Suite accounts provided to teachers for taking online classes, exams, providing study material, conducting meetings and doing other administrative works.

Library Orientation Programmes conducted online for both faculty and students to help them access e-resources remotely. Further, IQAC has resolved to continue with MOOC-NPTEL course programmes for the students.

The IQAC in its minutes has proposed Sociology in 2017 as a General subject for other Honours subjects in the college.

It has also introduced two new value-added courses, namely, (a) Business English Communication Skills and (b) Chinese Mandarin Course in 2017.

IQAC has also ensured almost 92% utilization of the first-instalment of RUSA 2.0 grant for construction, renovation and procurement and 2nd instalment of grant applied for pursuance with the government for acquiring land for building a new campus.

Application has been forwarded to concerned government authority for installation of solar power panels on building rooftop.

MOUs signed with reputed NGOs, Calcutta Ekatma and Mother Earth Foundation as part of continuous social responsibility initiatives and community engagement, through NSS Unit I,Social Awareness Club and Cultural Club.

Several environmental programmes and social outreach activities has been under the purview of college IQAC body.

College has a fee-waiver scheme. All students are given equal opportunities to avail the scholarships funded by the state and the central government.

The college strictly adheres to the government policy of reservation.

Mentoring is one method used to address the probelms of each and every student with equal importance.

Psycho-social Counselling, gender awareness activities, library orientation are conducted keep in in view the diverse needs of studnets at different difficulty amd problem levels.

Sangachhadwam sangbadadhyam sang vo Manam shi janatam' — this invocation from the RgVeda leads the stakeholders to move forward together with a common goal. The prayer song tuned by Gurudev Rabindranath Tagore has been the concluding hymn sung by the teachers. Staff and students observe the death anniversary the Founder-Principal Dr S.E. Rani Ghosh on 18th November in a solemn pledge to work together in unity and harmony. Cultural events, College Magazine, Sports and various other activities are organized regularly. These are the platforms that college provides where many students participate, work cohesively and exchange ideas and thus get to know each other in the process.

International Mother Language Day and Hindi Diwas are observed with equal enthusiasm.

Workshops and lectures are conducted to sensitize the students about their rights as women and to inculcate in them the confidence that they are no less capable than men.

A workshop on gerontology sensitized students on the aspects of ageing and the psycho-social connect.

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Co-curricular programmes are organized in all the three languages, Bengali, Hindi and English. Insternational Mother Language Day and Hindi Divas are observed.

Events such as video presentation of "Partition and its Impact on the Indian Society" brought all students together to understand their shared heritage and history.

#### **Answer:**

### **Best Practice I**

**Title: Library Orientation Programmes** 

## **Objective:**

Conducting Library Orientation Programmes (LOP) in GMGC in every new academic session to equip new entrants with knowledge of the Central library of the College, its facilities, its website and the rules and regulations that govern proper functioning of this important campus resource.

#### **Context:**

"As we read so we produce". Underlying principle of LOPs is to make library use easy and effective for students at all course and difficulty levels so that they visit the library frequently and acquire knowledge that can be applied.

## **Practice:**

The College Library reflects the government initiatives in higher education, its role in teaching, research and extension activities in HEIs. LOPs in GMGC conducted since 2014, disseminate information about open-access shelves, the 5-user Libsys LSease software, now replaced with KOHA (22.11 version), OPAC searching, display racks for latest informational resources, cheap reprographic facility and Book Bank facility. During lockdown, online LOP organized by the Central Library and conducted by Sage

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Publications, Oxford University Press, Pearson Publications and McGraw Hill provided guidance for accessing e-books purchased with RUSA 2.0 grants.

#### **Outcome:**

- Increased library footfalls and N-list (INFLIBNET) usage statistics 5293 physical footfalls in 2016-17, 5098 in 2017-18, 4599 in 2018-19, 3090 up to March 2020 and zero footfalls from 16th March 2020 to January 2022 (the lockdown period).
- Increased usage of OPAC to access e-resource sites Shodhganga, e-Shodhsindhu through the library website www.gmgclibrary.wordpress.com
- National Library and Information Services Infrastructure records for scholarly content indicate downloads of 901 pages of study material in 2016, 3243 pages in 2017, 7035 pages in 2018, 4228 pages in 2019 and an impressive 26616 pages by 392 students in 2020 and 17362 pages by 359 students in 2021.
- e-resource users increased from 11 users in 2019 to 393 users in 2020.
- Central Library Website blog statistics showed 11418 visitors till January 2023.

#### **Constraints:**

- Arranging LOPs without disrupting the classes is a challenge.
- Accommodating a large number of students eager to use the reading room and reprographic facility is difficult.
- Internet connectivity disruptions and affordability are major constraints.
- Provision of adequate computer access in peak hours is difficult.

### **Best Practice II**

## Title: Psycho-Social Support and Counselling

## **Objective:**

Extension of psycho-social counselling to address students' diverse psychological problems arising out of medical needs and stresses connected with sickness and bereavements as during the Covid-19 pandemic or otherwise. Addressing such issues is essential for preventing future impairments.

#### **Context:**

In modern times, young minds develop psychological stress points arising from personal medical conditions, familial medical and financial conditions, peer pressures, community issues and academic stresses. The faculty observes the students closely for the stress points. The institution facilitated initially through counselling sessions, lectures, awareness programmes and then by appointing a duly qualified counsellor to counsel the students on a regular basis.

## **Practice:**

Various programmes were undertaken as follows:

- In 2017, counselling session by Dr. Nilanjana Sanyal, Professor of Psychology, University of Calcutta for the First Year students. Students anonymously dropped their problems in writing in a drop box and their problems addressed and Special Lecture on "Importance of Emotional Intelligence in Life & Education" by Prof. Debasri Banerjee, University of Calcutta.
- A three-hour session conducted on 13.07 2019 by Dr Mitul Sengupta, Director, Rhythmosaic Dance and Movement Therapy Institute on "Skill enhancement through the practice of movement" on the creative potential of students. The speaker/therapist used body movement and dance as an empathetic creative process to explain the means of integrating emotional, cognitive, physical, social and spiritual aspects of self.
- Special Lecture on "Adolescence and its Problems" on 09.09.2019 by Dr. Muktipada Sinha, Professor of Education, Jadavpur University, Kolkata

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• Online counselling in five sessions for all 3rd Year Students waiting to appear for their final examinations - "Meaning Making in the Times of Corona" from 11.05.2020 to 15.05.2020 by Counsellor: Dr. Shatabhisha Chatterjee, Clinical Psychologist. Mental Health Foundation, Kolkata, to find ways face the sudden career uncertainty related to the pandemic through Recovery Oriented Cognitive Therapy (CT-R) - togetherness, helpfulness and a sense of control to continue progress in a long period of social isolation.

- Two-day lecture series on "Perception of Confinement: Psychological Connotations across Generations" Dr. Nilanjana Sanyal, Retd. Professor, Department of Psychology, University of Calcutta, Dr. Rajlaxmi Guha, Assistant Professor, Centre for Educational Technology, Joint Faculty of the Centre for Happiness, IIT Kharagpur and Dr. Pritha Mukherjee, Professor, Dept of Psychology, University of Calcutta on 17.06.2020 and 18.06.2020.
- Online Hope Workshop on Mental Health and Suicide Prevention conducted by Techfest IIT Bombay on 27.09.2020 for GMGC students by professional counsellors emphasizing the key aspects of recognizing mental health issues, and how to live a stress-free and fulfilling lifestyle during the lockdown. College Ambassador Aayushi Bhattacharya, student of Economics received a medal of recognition. Participants were provided e-certificates.
- From May to July 2021, Department of Psychology, NSS Unit-1 and MGNCRE SES REC collaborated to provide inclusive online psychological counselling to all students External experts spoke to grieving students who had lost their near and dear ones. These Psycho-Social Support initiatives were an integral part of the Beat Covid Campaign 'Each One Reach One' and were recognized by the MGNCRE. Certificates of participation were provided to the Covid volunteers.
- As a part of students' Week Programme, initiative of the Govt. of West Bengal, the College Alumni Aassociation and Student Welfare sub- Committee organized a two-day online counselling session for the students titled, "Mental Health Concerns ofthe youthin the Pandemic: Chaos, Challenges and Coping" on 5th and 6th Jan.2022. Dr. Rudrani Chatterjee and Smt. Sreetama Chatterjee, both Alumni and Clinical Psychologists in IPGMER, Kolkata.
- In February 2022, College engaged the services of Yashabanti Sreemany of "Crystal Minds" to conduct weekly sessions of counselling for all students and special sessions to address specific personal problems.

## **Outcome:**

Psycho-social counselling has helped students cope with psycho-social problems. Students have benefitted from the one-to-one counselling by the college counsellor who counsels the students' guardians too if necessary.

#### **Constraints:**

Student's shyness to approach the counsellor is a constraint.
