Besides, College also availed of guest faculty paid out of College funds to fulfill academic need.

Students of the three Major Courses were sent for internship programmes to various sector as per their curriculum requirements. Tata Consultancy Services conducted a five days Corporate Employability Training Programme and selection interview for job placement. Lowe Lintas and Partners, Mumbai, conducted a selection process for their 18 months Apprenticeship Programme. IQST consultants conducted a Pre-Screening process for jobs in the Corporate Sector.

The College entered into collaboration with Pranavananda Institute of Management and Technology to run Value added Courses for the College students in the College premises. The College also tied up with Young Women's Christian Association in order to provide hostel accommodation to the students of the Institution.
